From Carol Gilg, a Scholarship winner, 2006:

I attended the SGNA annual course in San Antonio in May of 2006. During the 6 days there were many educational opportunities and many opportunities to network with other professionals. I have always been interested in any ethical or legal issues and we were presented a very interesting case of a recent malpractice suit against a nurse in Arkansas. It was presented by a nurse-attorney and a GI legal nurse consultant.

The question is– Are we legally responsible if a patient drives himself home after receiving sedation for a GI procedure. In this case on admission the patient stated that he had a ride home, the

procedure was done under sedation and when discharging the patient it was discovered that the patient did not have a ride and he intended to drive himself home. He was offered many different options such as being admitted to the hospital overnight, calling someone to drive him, keeping him for 8 hrs in the hospital before driving and the patient refused all of these options. When his wife was called she did not understand the concern as she stated that when the patient was there a couple of weeks before for a different GI procedure the patient had driven home because she does not drive. This was the first the staff knew of this because when he was in previously he stated his wife was driving home and his wife accompanied him for that procedure.

The patient left the hospital because he could not be physically restrained, he drove and was involved in a one car accident and he died. After a couple of years the patient's wife sued the hospital and the nurse.

This case demonstrated the importance of proper documentation of all the events that took place that day.

After 2 appellate courts trials the GI nurse was absolved from liability and the case was resolved.

This case demonstrated that nurses can't be held liable if a patient does not tell the truth before receiving sedation, we can't physically restrain a patient from leaving the hospital, and the patient has to assume some responsibility if he refuse all

attempts to keep him safe. It is our responsibility to keep our patient's safe and we must be sure they have a ride home before sedation is given. If they do not have a ride the procedure needs to be canceled or the patient has the option of having the procedure without sedation. It also reinforces the importance of complete documentation to protect us against malpractice. This is just one example of the many excellent educational opportunities available during the Annual Course. I encourage everyone to try to attend the SGNA Annual Course whenever possible.
